January

1 Setting our plan and goals for the year for the Foundation

January is traditionally a quiet month in the Employee Foundation with many of our employees on holidays and winding back up slowly after the Christmas break. It's a time for planning for the Foundation Management Committee and trustees, and our targets against our strategic plan are set.

2 Volunteering – Hutt St Breakfast, Oz Harvest

Our ongoing volunteering happens all year round. We serve breakfast at the Hutt St Centre every Tuesday morning. The Hutt St Centre provides a wide range of services to Homeless and vulnerable people including housing, employment, education, nursing, laundry services and more than 45,000 meals. Their goal is to rebuild the lives of thousands of people experiencing homelessness and ultimately end homelessness in the streets of Adelaide.

Our volunteers do two shifts per month on the OzHarvest food rescue van. OzHarvest rescues surplus food and redistributes it to charities supporting people in need and thereby also prevents waste going to landfill.

3 Goodwill bins for Lifeline

We also have ongoing donations of goods to our Goodwill bins across our network, the proceeds of which go to Lifeline to support the training of their volunteer counsellors. In 2017 we introduced regular shifts at Backpacks 4 SA Kids who are featured in the March section of this report. We have many formal and informal volunteering opportunities and our amazing volunteer pool grows and evolves every year. In 2017 we had 219 volunteers across 37 different volunteering opportunities for 18 different South Australian charities.

February

1 Jim's Lofty Ride (Cancer Council)

Jim's Lofty Ride, held in memory of our colleague and friend Jim McCartney, has become an annual event. Organised by Mark Pritchard and Mick Pell, a group of cyclists of varying degrees of skill ride to Mount Lofty summit and return via Jim's memorial tree at Karka Pavilion in Belair National Park. All proceeds from the ride are donated to the Cancer Council. In 2017 we had 32 cyclists join the ride and donate \$4,700 to Cancer Council SA as a result. 2 Book Sale for Deaf Can Do and Lions Hearing Dogs

In February Mike Lucas and Jennifer Harrison, two very talented SA Power Networks employees, launched their children's book – Olivia's Voice - which tells the story of a deaf girl. As part of the book launch Mike and Jennifer raised funds towards Lions Hearing Dogs and Deaf Can Do so that kids in our community who are deaf can be better supported. Several SA Power Networks employees or their family members are featured in the book with Jennifer's hand drawn illustrations and Mike's wonderful text. The book has since won a Notable Children's Book Council Award. Their efforts resulted in \$1600 being donated to Lions Hearing Dogs and Deaf Can Do.

Lions hearing dogs is also one of our key charity causes in the Foundation and as a result received donations of \$10,000 from our funds in 2017 to improve the facilities at their Verdun training centre in the Adelaide Hills. Lions Hearing Dogs take rescued dogs from shelters and train them to be hearing assistance dogs. These are provided to members of the community who are deaf, completely free of charge.

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March

1 DVD drive for Backpacks 4 SA Kids

In March we held a DVD drive for Backpacks 4 SA Kids. Backpacks 4 SA Kids produce backpacks for children entering emergency foster care and domestic violence shelters. They bring joy, dignity and care to children at a very difficult and stressful time of their lives. The DVDs provide distraction and stress relief to the kids and are a vital component of the packs. Across our organisation we collected and donated over 800 DVDs. Backpacks also received donations from the Employee Foundation of \$11,400 in 2017 to fund goods and to re-do their web site. Our volunteers did four shifts in 2017 sorting and packing goods, logistics work in the warehouse and, in December, wrapping Christmas gifts.

2 World's Greatest Shave for Leukaemia Foundation

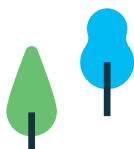
World's Greatest Shave for the Leukaemia Foundation is held in March each year. In 2017 we had 10 shavers for our Shave event held in our outdoor meals area at our Keswick offices. There were lots of laughs and some interesting haircuts along the way. The event resulted in a donation of \$16,400 to the Leukaemia Foundation to fund their accommodation village at Lightsview, which provides family accommodation to country Leukaemia patients coming to Adelaide for treatment.

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April

1 Easter Appeal for Women's and Children's Hospital Foundation

In 2017 we joined forces with the Women's and Children's Hospital Foundation for their Easter Appeal, which saw us have visits from Breadhead, the Bakers Delight mascot, to sell Hot Cross Buns, and the Easter bunny to deliver them. We had an Easter raffle to raise funds also. Our efforts resulted in a donation of \$6,200 to the Women's and Children's Hospital Foundation.

2 Dignity Drive for Share The Dignity

We participated in the April Dignity drive for Share the Dignity, collecting feminine hygiene products across several sites for the month of April, to donate to homeless women, domestic violence shelters and drought and flood victims. We also did fund raising at Enerven, an International Women's Day fund raiser and made an additional donation resulting in a total of \$12,570 going to Share the Dignity in 2017.

3 Mercer Super Cycle for Under Our Roof

Mercer SuperCycle was in its fifth year in 2017 with our riders cycling around South Australia for seven days. The 2017 event resulted in a donation of \$33,800 to the Hospital Research Foundation, our biggest SuperCycle cheque yet, bringing the SuperCycle total to \$124,900. There is a clear need for more accommodation, with more than 21 patient bookings turned away due to full occupancy in 2017, plus many more enquiries during fully booked periods. So, with the help of funds raised through Mercer SuperCycle, in 2017 THRF purchased a three-bedroom apartment in Bowden, South Australia. This is currently under construction.

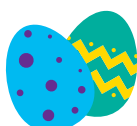

1 Multiple events for Mary Potter Hospice (Mary Potter Foundation) – Mother's Day Raffle, Morning tea, BBQ

May was Mary Potter month for the Employee Foundation. Mary Potter Hospice and its Foundation is a key charity cause for the Employee Foundation. In May 2017 we held a Mother's Day raffle and fundraising BBQ and also entered a team into their Walk for Love event. Our efforts during May resulted in a donation of \$12,600 and in total we donated \$32,600 to Mary Potter in 2017. From Cathy Murphy Executive Director of the Mary Potter Foundation –

Ultimately you helped both the patient and their family share treasured moments together".

2 Walk to D-Feet MND for Motor Neurone Disease association

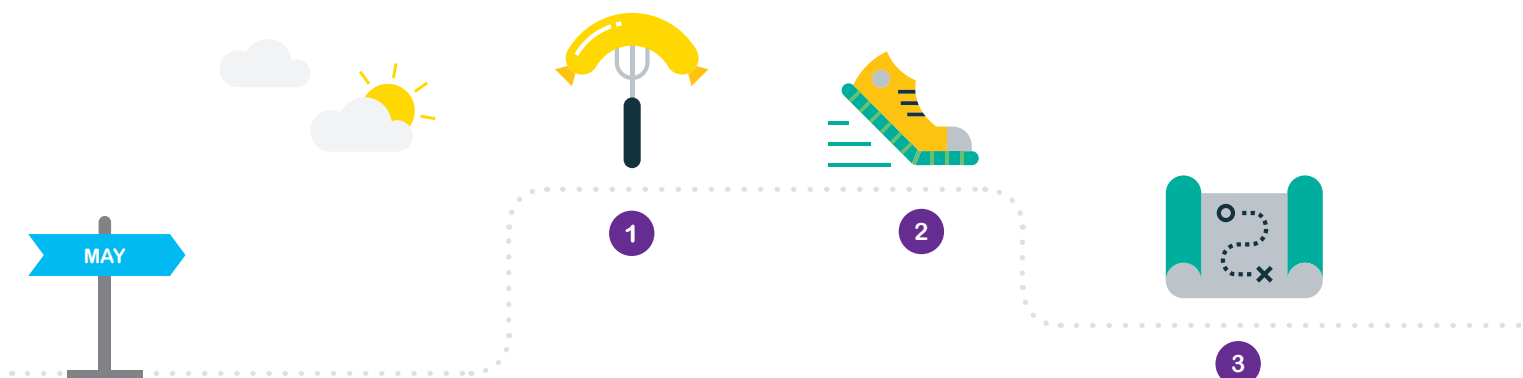
In May we also had teams participate in the Walk to D-Feet MND (Motor Neurone Disease). The MND association received \$5,300.

2 Sparks in The Park for Women's and Children's Hospital Foundation

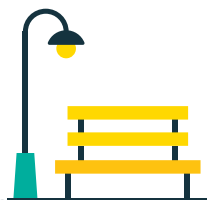
The Sparks in the Park crew have been exercising madly for five years now and show no signs of tiring! In 2017 they ran rounds 12, 13 and 14 of Sparks resulting in donations of \$14,400. In total \$53,670 was donated to the Women's and Children's Hospital Foundation in 2017 and was used to fund the purchase of laptops for remote community health centres in the APY lands, to purchase equipment for the Home Equipment Centre, including sleep apnoea machines, breast pumps, and enuresis alarms. Sparks money has been allocated to the Beach House project, which will provide holiday accommodation to families with children with life-limiting or long-term chronic illnesses to provide a peaceful place where families can take a much needed break. Some funds also went to pet therapy programmes and \$10,000 was used to purchase a gift for every child in the hospital at Christmas time.

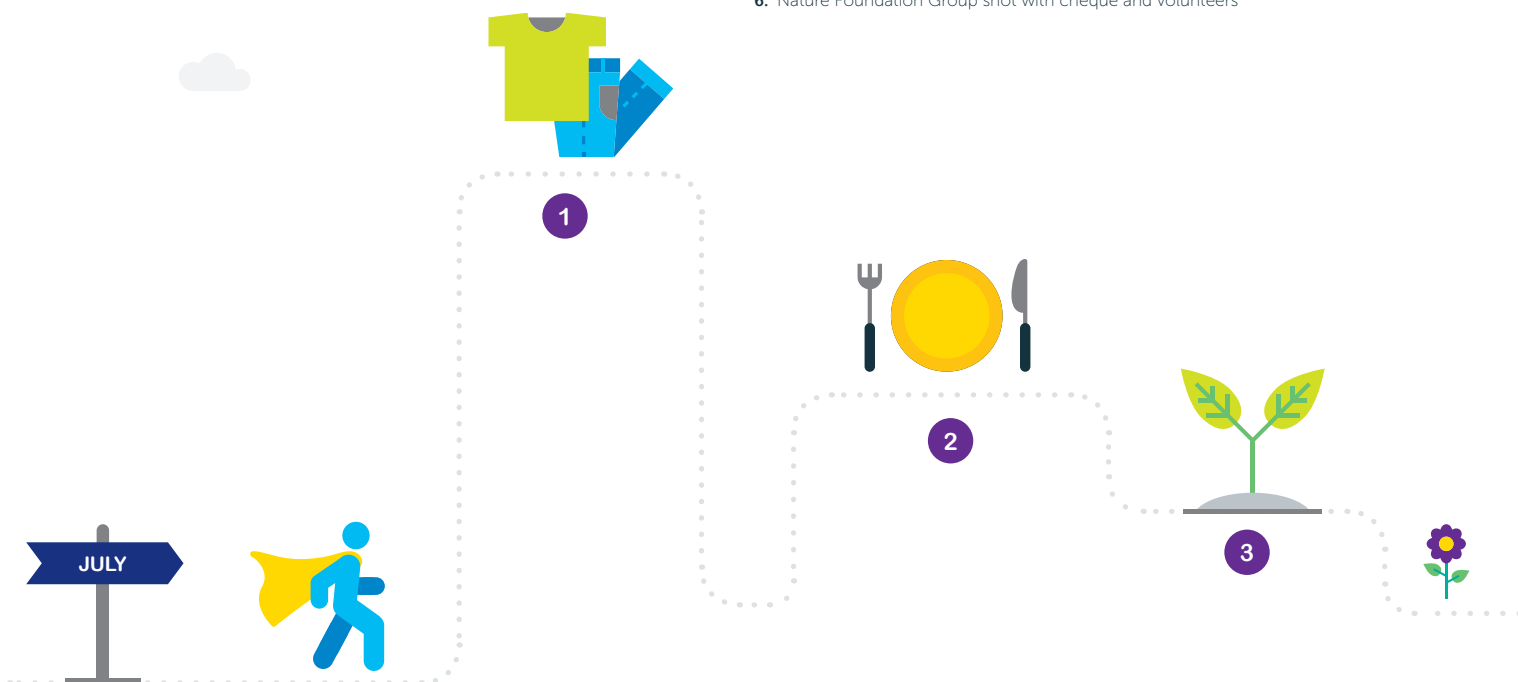
We participated in Angel for a Day for Hutt St Centre. Our donation of \$5,000 made us Archangels for July, funding the kitchen for a month.

3 Lifeline fundraising (chocs and chips)

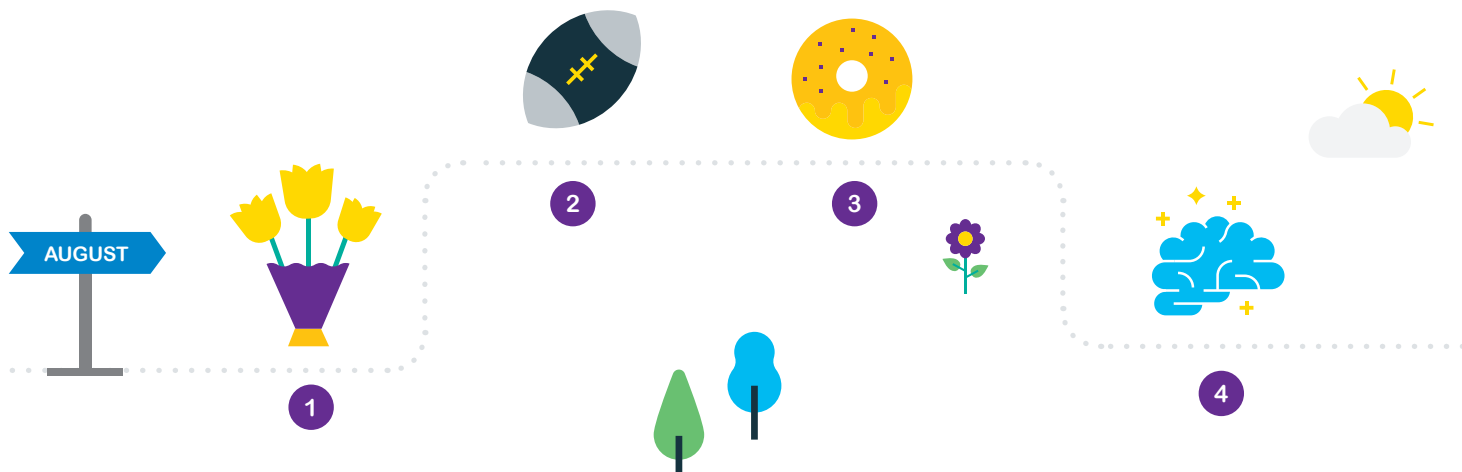

1 Fundraising for Hutt St Centre

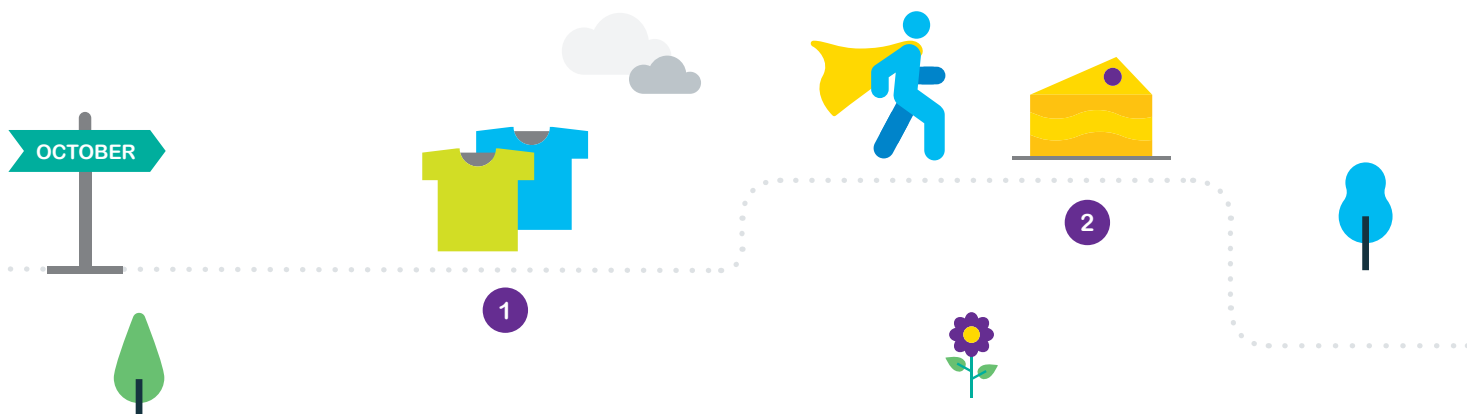
"Thank you for making an impact and helping to change lives in 2017. Your generous contribution supported critical Early Intervention services, which teaches children with hearing impairments aged 0-5 and their parents how to use their assistive hearing devices (cochlear implants, hearing aids etc.) to develop listening skills, acquire language and develop vocabulary and speech in line with other children their age. This gives them the best possible preparation for their school years, so that by the time they are five years-old, close to 80% have age-appropriate listening and speech levels and are able to attend and fully participate in mainstream schools with their hearing peers", said Drew Petersen of Cora Barclay.

1 Relay For Life for Cancer Council

The key event for the Foundation each year is our very own Relay For Life, hosted by our volunteers at Belair National Park. This year we had 17 teams, 157 registered participants plus many visitors who came along to enjoy the atmosphere and contribute throughout the day (and night).

There was entertainment galore for the whole family. Teams who had never joined our Relay before but have participated elsewhere, said it was the best one they had ever been to.

"We couldn't hold the event without the generous support of our event sponsors, many of whom come back year after year and are acknowledged later in this report," said Vicki.

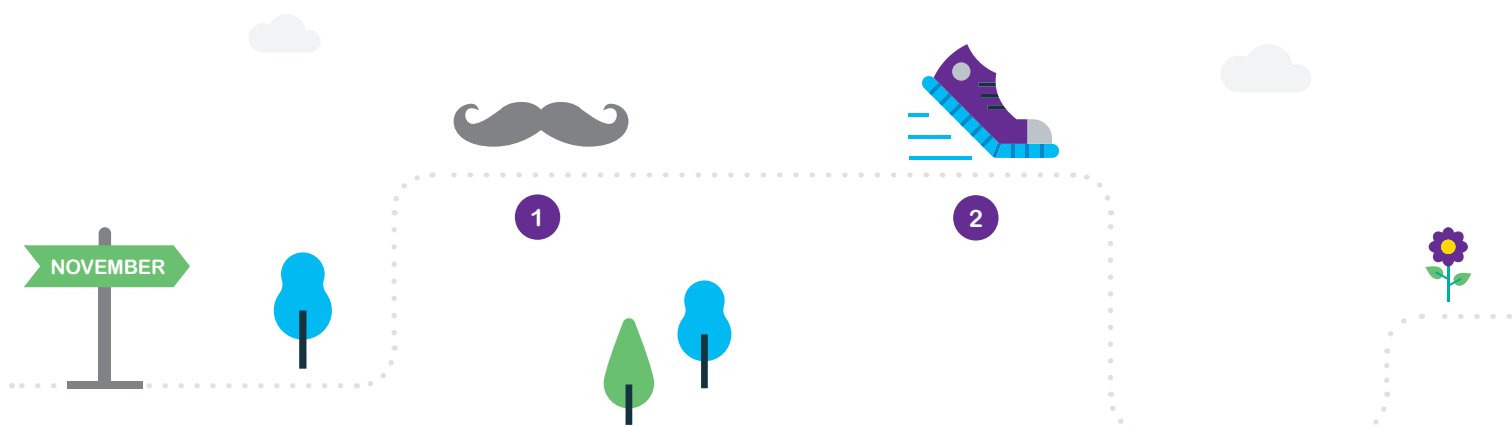
We raised a whopping \$53,855 which was a great deal more than our expected goal of \$40,000. A significant portion of this outcome was due to the efforts of the Ardrossan Angels, who were amazing fund raisers and great fun to Relay with! With added funds from the Foundation, a cheque for \$70,000 was presented to Cancer Council SA. This money will fund the renovation of an additional seven rooms at Flinders Lodge in 2018.

About our foundation



The SA Power Networks Employee Foundation is established as a charitable trust.

The Trustees of the Foundation are Executive Managers of SA Power Networks. Day to day management of the Foundation is vested in the Management Committee, which consists of three people nominated by the Trustees and eight employee elected representatives serving a two-year term.
