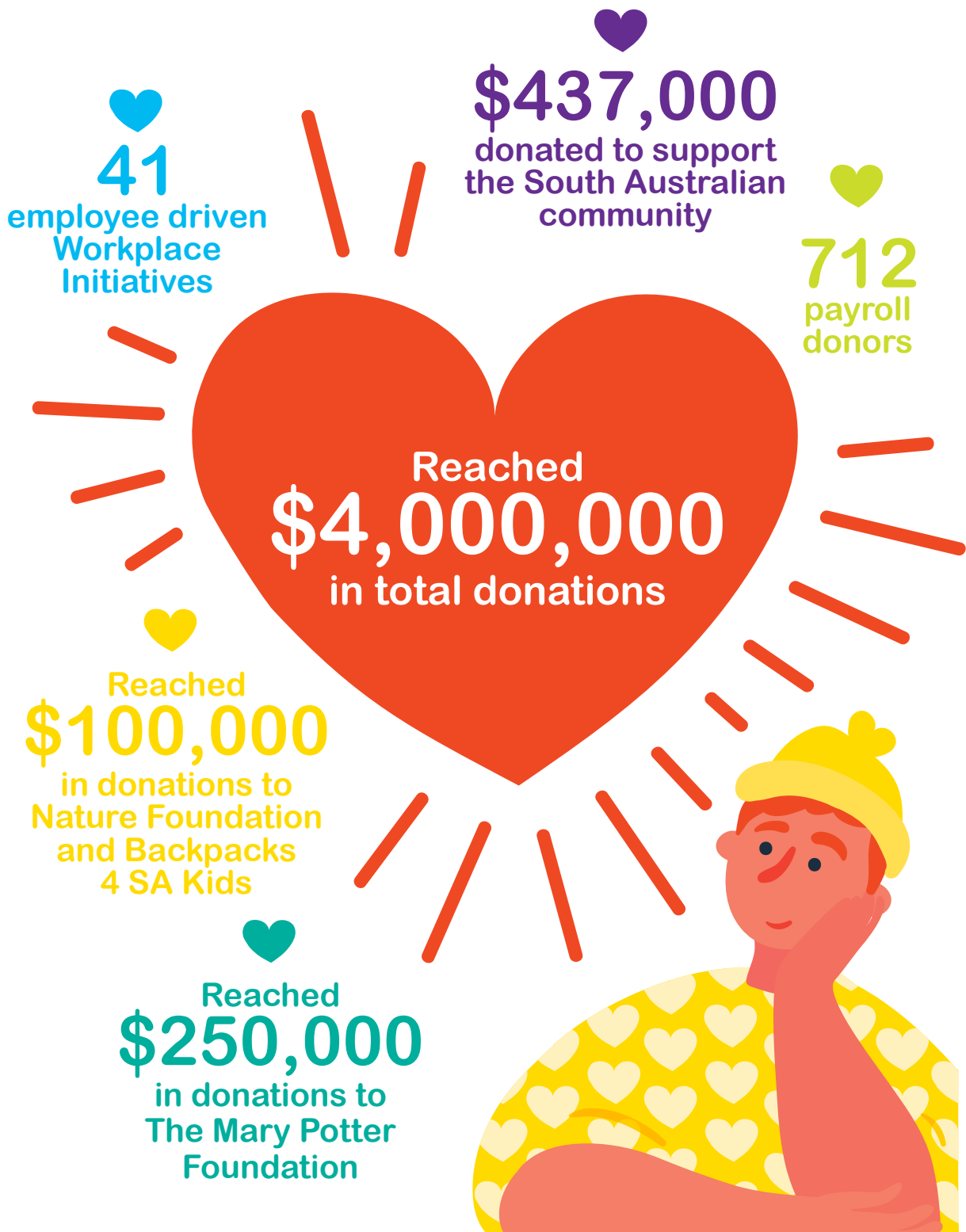
# Our Vision

# Linking our Payroll Donor funds to real outcomes

## 202 Greenhill Road

Our focus for the 2021-2023 period is supporting the build of Cancer Council SA's multipurpose facility at 202 Greenhill Road. This building will incorporate accommodation for country cancer patients, support services, research, Quitline, Sun Smart, as well as housing fundraising and administration teams all under one roof. Our funds are specifically going towards the accommodation facilities as this has been our focus for many years when we supported Flinders Lodge. We have committed \$150,000 over three years to this project.



## Big Talks for Little People

As a major partner, we have committed to supporting Breakthrough Mental Health Research Foundation for three years with funding towards their Big Talks for Little People project. This project aims to address mental health issues that not only affect children, but their families, friends, teachers, and the wider community. It's important that early intervention and prevention strategies are provided that equip children with the tools to ensure their wellbeing and resilience as they get older. This program is funded at \$20,000 per year for three years and will be rolled out to primary schools and sporting clubs across South Australia.



## Mary Potter Hospice Engagement Calendar

In 2021, we donated \$10,000 to The Mary Potter Foundation from payroll donor funds to fund the Hospice Engagement Calendar from September to December 2021. The calendar brought a feeling of normality into a place which is anything but normal. Being in the Hospice at any time of year can be difficult, but this is especially so on calendar days when others outside the Hospice are celebrating. With each celebration and activity, we tried to bring a moment of joy, spark conversation, recognise much-loved traditions, create new memories and distract and entertain.

## Remote Piloted Aircraft for nature surveys

In 2021, payroll donations helped fund the purchase of a Remote Piloted Aircraft (RPA) to do Thermal Camera Assisted Aerial Surveys for Nature Foundation.

The aim of this project is to validate RPA thermal technology to estimate the density, abundance, and distribution of large native mammals (yellow footed rock wallabies, wombats) and feral species (cats, goats, foxes) in Witchelina and Hiltaba Nature Reserves in remote South Australia. The project will also calibrate on-ground survey methodologies (eg thermal binocular surveys). If proven successful, this will allow Nature Foundation to undertake cost effective surveys at a much greater scale, improving its monitoring and evaluation programs of native and feral species.



## Home Equipment Centre

We have supported the Home Equipment Centre at the Women's and Children's Hospital, through the Women's and Children's Hospital Foundation for five years. In 2021, we funded the purchase of six portable electrocardiogram (ECG) recorders. The recorders last seven days and allow patients to go about their normal days at home/school, meaning the cardiology team receives the most accurate idea of how the patient's heart works in an average week. These simple to use machines are especially useful for teenagers that are fainting or have chest pain, allowing the cardiology team to see their heart rhythm at the time that they're having their symptoms. The recorders not only help to diagnose if there is an irregularity but help provide peace of mind to patients and families. They are also small and versatile enough that they can be used on newborn babies.



## Wheelienet Disability Awareness Program

In 2021, payroll donors funded the purchase of a new trailer for Novita's Wheelienet Disability Awareness Program. The program aims to raise awareness of wheelchair sports in South Australia, encourage safe driving, highlight the dangers of drinking, drug-taking and poor decision-making in everyday life, improve understanding of people living with spinal cord injury, and encourage participation.





# Letting kids be kids

## Backpacks 4 SA Kids

With COVID restrictions abounding, Backpacks 4 SA Kids lost many of their corporate and retiree volunteers in 2021. On more than one occasion they were left short for volunteers and they put the call in to our Employee Foundation to try and fill the gap. We were able to come to the rescue several times to complete urgent orders and also to set up their Christmas gift wrapping venue which could not be in their regular warehouse due to lack of space and the need for their regular programs to continue during the festive season. Our regular Christmas gift wrapping session is always very popular and 2021 was no exception. Our volunteers wrapped a truck load of gifts for displaced kids so that they could wake up knowing they got a visit from Santa. We also raffled off a Corporate Box for the Christmas Pageant, kindly donated by Enerven, to raise funds for Backpacks 4 SA Kids' Christmas program.

Additionally, our pyjama drive raised funds towards the purchase of new pairs of pyjamas to go into backpacks with the opportunity to write a message of hope on a postcard to a displaced child. Throughout the whole of 2021, our employees gave over 200 volunteer hours as well as \$24,600 in donations.

## Can:Do 4Kids

Loud Shirt Day was celebrated across multiple sites, raising funds for Can:Do 4Kids and the Cora Barclay Listening and Spoken Language Program. Chief Financial Officer, Kevin Jones, hosted proceedings at our Keswick office, with many staff stepping out of their comfort zone to get loud for a good cause. Our Kadina and Yorketown depots decided to join forces to celebrate and fundraise for the day. Our combined efforts, with dollar matching and a generous top up, resulted in \$12,200 being donated.



## Childhood Cancer Association

### The \$20k Mullet

Joshua Newnham, of CBD Operations, shaved off his legendary mullet in February 2021 after several cancelled attempts due to COVID. The pictures tell the story better than any words. With support from his family, friends, work colleagues and footy club, Josh's efforts resulted in a donation of \$25,500 to the Childhood Cancer Association.



### Top 8 B4 Round 8

Back for its sixth year in 2021, the Top 8 Footy Tipping competition was stronger than ever. With a record number of participants recruited by Kev Connell from Vegetation Services, and an outright winner in Mick Taskas, the biggest winner of all was the Childhood Cancer Association.



## Children's Medical Research Institute

For her second year in a row, Anna Rubacha from Customer and Community participated in the Great Cycle Challenge, raising funds for the Children's Medical Research Institute, specifically for research into kids' cancer. With dollar matching from the Employee Foundation, Anna's great cycling efforts resulted in \$2,300 being donated to kids' cancer research.

## Operation Flinders Foundation

Several teams from SA Power Networks participated in the challenging but rewarding experience of trekking 22 kilometres through the suburbs to Mount Lofty Summit as a part of the Operation Flinders City to Summit Challenge. Two teams - one led by Executive General Manager Innovation & Technology, Chris Ford and the other led by Executive General Manager Governance & Regulation, Patrick Makinson - embarked on the five-hour journey. The trek ended with an overnight stay at Woodhouse Activity Centre - braving the cold with just a ground mat and sleeping tarp.

The event was organised by the Operation Flinders Foundation, which transforms the lives of young people from challenging and disadvantaged backgrounds by helping develop confidence, ambition and self-worth while camping in the Flinders Ranges. The trekkers exceeded their fundraising targets, raising a combined \$27,000 for Operation Flinders.



## Variety SA

We have several connections to the Variety Bash, some going back many years. Gary Edwards, from our Holden Hill depot supported the Variety Bash for seven years, and in 2021, joined Variety SA's Aussie Muscle Car Run. Michael Robran from Network Management has stepped up in recent years to fundraise for his mother's team, "The Minions", and Amanda Pix from Governance and Regulation started her Bash journey in 2021. Between the teams over \$20,000 was donated to Variety SA.



## Women's and Children's Hospital Foundation

Mike Lucas from Property Services has been raising funds for charity for over six years and in 2021 held a book sale with proceeds going to the Women's and Children's Hospital Foundation. Mike's efforts resulted in a donation of \$2,100 going directly towards their Home Equipment Centre.

# Lending a helping paw

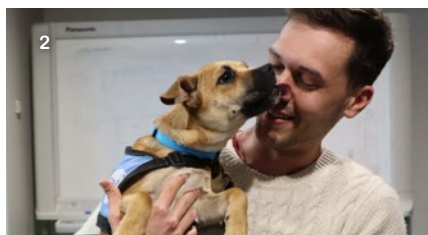
## Royal Society for the Blind

2021 was our third year of support for the OPK9 program run by Royal Society for the Blind. The OPK9 program provides trained therapy dogs to veterans with PTSD. It combines a veteran-centric approach along with a comprehensive program that responds to each veteran's unique experience and circumstance. Offering choice and control throughout the program provides a unique and genuine opportunity for veterans to shape their own recovery pathway. Our funds go directly to the training of OPK9 dogs for veterans.



## Australian Lions Hearing Dogs

Since 1980, Australian Lions Hearing Dogs have provided a set of 'furry ears' to many hundreds of Australians who are deaf or hard of hearing. In 2021, the Employee Foundation committed to funding the training of Lions Hearing Assistance dog Elroy until he is ready to go to his forever home with someone who needs hearing assistance. Training each assistance dog can take between 6-8 months and costs approximately \$37,000. Anthony von der Borch from Customer and Community got to name Elroy in appreciation of the amazing support he has given the Foundation over the last 18 months. Anthony chose the name Elroy for two reasons, he wanted to pay tribute to Elle, our previously sponsored pup who didn't end up graduating (however was adopted by PLEC Executive Officer, Mike Magin), and because Anthony owned a teddy bear as a child called Elroy.



## Guide Dogs SA/NT

In 2021, we had multiple work groups participate in Pawgust, a fitness challenge for the month of August to raise funds for Guide Dogs SA/NT. This is a particular passion for Janelle Fairbank from our Holden Hill depot, whose son has used their services extensively. The funds raised from Pawgust go towards training Guide Dog puppies. Esky, a Guide Dogs ambassador, came along to our Keswick office to thank us for the donation.

## Animal Rescue, Rehabilitation and Conservation

The Employee Foundation has supported different charities helping both native and domesticated animals across South Australia, donating over \$150,000 since we started. In 2021 the majority of funds donated were to cat and dog rescue and rehabilitation charities driven by Melissa Rasche from our Angle Park warehouse. Melissa is passionate about the cause and works tirelessly to support these animals. Melissa's efforts resulted in an amazing \$8,750 shared between 17 different South Australian charities in 2021.

# Lifting people up

## Foodbank SA

Throughout the year, staff from around the business volunteered for different shifts at Foodbank SA to help with hamper packing, product sorting and food replenishment. During December, we ran a non-perishable food and cash donation drive, resulting in 83 kilos of food delivered just in time for Christmas and a donation of \$600.



## Hutt St Centre

Staff from across the business took part in Hutt St Centre's annual Walk a Mile in My Boots fundraising event. This was the second consecutive year teams embraced the new COVID-friendly format and avoided the increasing crowds which usually walk a mile along Hutt St in the CBD. Our volunteers also serve breakfast every Tuesday morning and have done for 15 years. With the incredible fundraising effort of staff and additional funds from the Employee Foundation we were proud to present a cheque for \$31,500 to Hutt St Centre.



## White Ribbon Australia & Zahra Foundation

White Ribbon Australia and Zahra Foundation are two charities both working hard to eliminate gendered violence. On White Ribbon Day, in conjunction with our Diversity & Inclusion Committee, we set up a White Ribbon Tribute Wall at our Keswick office to commit to stand up, speak out and support those who have been affected by domestic violence. With all the fundraising efforts, including a raffle organised by Isabell Al-Nahat, Marni Judd, Anthony von der Borch and Kate Murray, over \$2,500 was donated to both White Ribbon Australia and Zahra Foundation.



## MND South Australia

The Walk to D'Feet MND has been a part of the Foundation's calendar for six consecutive years with several staff members having relatives affected by MND and taking part in the 2021 walk to raise money. Additionally, Sparks Using Office is an initiative of IT's Leigh Gembus and Simon Burrow, which aims to provide a meaningful and hands on approach to IT issues in our organisation – all while raising funds. MND South Australia is now a major charity partner and in 2021 received a total of \$23,300 in donations.



## The Mary Potter Foundation

During 2021, we participated in The Mary Potter Foundation Walk for Love in memory of our colleague and friend Wayne Lissner. We also held a BBQ and bake sale hosted by Executive General Manager Customer & Community, Jessica Vonthethoff, and later in the year our volunteers decorated the Hospice for Christmas. In total, we donated \$22,000 to The Mary Potter Foundation for the year.

# Looking for answers

## Ovarian Cancer Research Foundation

Frocktober saw staff from around the business donning their finest attire to raise funds for the Ovarian Cancer Research Foundation.

Leigh Cardinal from Keswick and Melissa Rasche from our Angle Park warehouse led the charge, with Executive General Manager Governance & Regulation, Patrick Makinson kindly sponsoring a morning tea for the Frocktober celebration and judging of best frock. Both Leigh and Melissa have a personal connection with the cause, with Leigh's grandmother dying from ovarian cancer and Melissa's mum a survivor. The events, raffle and donation pages resulted in a final donation of \$4,900.

## Hospital Research Foundation

Mercer SuperCycle has been dedicated to supporting regional cancer patients by keeping families together under one roof for ten years. The team – Mark Vincent, Doug Schmidt, Mark Clarke and Paul Topping – has donated more than \$210,000 over the 10 years towards the Hospital Research Foundation's 'Under Our Roof' program, providing family-style accommodation for country cancer patients. 2021 saw the team participate in the final Mercer SuperCycle ride and donated \$17,300. An incredible achievement from the entire team, and all their supporters over the last 10 years.



## Kidney Health Australia

Alex Garden from Field Services at Marlestone, who suffers from Polycystic Kidney Disease, wanted to raise awareness and funds for the disease. Alex ran a Red Socks Appeal Workplace Initiative and her efforts resulted in a \$3,000 donation to Kidney Health Australia and lots of red socks on her friends and colleagues.

## Breakthrough Mental Health Research Foundation

The inaugural Fleurieu Golf Day was held in 2021 to raise money for Breakthrough Mental Health Research Foundation. Hosted by Rhys Evans from Victor Harbor and Clayton Webb from Mt Barker, the day was declared a success by all who attended - none more so than Cameron Daniell who scored a hole in one. The day resulted in a \$13,000 donation to support mental health research.



## Cancer Council SA

We held numerous fundraisers in 2021 for Cancer Council SA. As our key charity partner, Cancer Council SA is popular for employee fundraisers as well as Foundation events.
