Executive Officer report

In 2022 we started to bring back together the pieces of our disjointed and somewhat isolated selves to recreate the beautiful thing that is our Foundation and its footprint across the South Australian community.

"The whole is greater than the sum of its parts" is a common misquote from Aristotle and applies most truly to our organisation, our people, and our Employee Foundation.

We responded to calls for help from across the State (and interstate), we reached out to the most vulnerable and disadvantaged in our community, and we gave our time and our funds to a broad range of causes, as our people saw the need and wanted to help.

Some of the traction that was lost during the worst of the Covid pandemic was regained in 2022, particularly as I was able to get out and visit our people again and share the Foundation's impact. Our donations reflected this with the total amount we gave away up by 25% on 2021, and our highest level in our 16-year history. Volunteering

In 2022 we embraced the opportunity to volunteer again and support our community with our time and skills.

We held multiple volunteering shifts out at the Backpacks 4 SA Kids warehouse throughout the year with staff helping to sort and pack goods for young people in need. Our annual Christmas gift wrapping shift was also back, where our staff volunteered to wrap gifts for kids who may not otherwise receive any. We also ran a donation drive collecting back-to-school supplies, which volunteers then sorted, and helped to assemble pencil cases and stationary packs. Lastly, we held a book sale at our Keswick office to raise money for Backpacks 4 SA Kids – an initiative of Mike Lucas – with our volunteers hosting the sale over several days.




We hosted several fundraising events throughout the year across multiple sites and our volunteers gave their time to sell raffle tickets, baked goods and confectionery for our charity partners. Charities that benefited from this volunteering included Variety SA, MND South Australia, RSPCA, Foodbank, Nature Foundation, Can:Do 4Kids and multiple animal rescue charities.



Our annual Daffodil Day event was once again a huge success and as always brought yellowness and joy across multiple of our sites, raising an amazing \$2,700 for Cancer Council SA. Our Daffodil Day volunteers always have a good time – even if it is a very early morning start.



With the return of the Royal Adelaide Show, we were back selling car parking in our Keswick basement over the two weekends. It was the busiest the car parking has ever been and raised over \$10,000, which was shared with Operation Flinders Foundation.

Mel Worrall stepped up for Legacy when they appealed to us for help with their Badge Day, as most of their volunteer base have passed away. We had volunteers selling badges, pens and other merchandise, and we donated a total \$1,400, which is the most they have ever had from a Badge Day here at our Keswick office.

Our volunteers spent a morning at Uniting SA Port Adelaide decorating their Christmas gift room (Santa's Cave) ready for the collection of gifts for their client families' children. Our team of volunteers from IT had a great time and certainly drew on their inner elves! To help fill the room, we collected toys, gifts and monetary donations in the lead up to Christmas across our sites.

Our regular volunteers have been serving breakfast every Tuesday morning at Hutt St Centre since 2005. This volunteering is mostly in our staff's own time before work. Many of the people on the roster have been volunteering at Hutt St Centre for 10 years or more.



Focus on Regional South Australia

As an organisation spread across the State, it is important for us to ensure the Foundation provides support to regional South Australians, who are often at a disadvantage for access to medical treatment and services.

Our regional staff are very generous payroll donors, with a higher percentage of staff in regional SA donating out of their pay compared to metropolitan employees. They also initiate or participate in fundraising events that support their local community or South Australia as a whole.



For many years we have been funding upgrades at Cancer Council SA's Flinders Lodge but in 2020, Cancer Council SA commenced the ambitious project of demolishing their old headquarters at 202 Greenhill Road to make way for a brand-new purpose-built centre for cancer prevention, fundraising, support, and accommodation for country cancer patients. Patients and a companion can access accommodation in the new building, with a range of support on site, making it a home away from home. Our fundraising in 2022 was focused on the build at 202 Greenhill Road.

Tim Strout from our Mt Barker depot has been running the Movember Golf Day at Nairne with groups of other keen regional golfers for four years in a row and all money raised from the event goes towards Movember Foundation to support men's health. Tim and his crew are stand outs in their bright pink shirts, but it certainly pays off with the donation growing year on year and a total of \$17,000 donated from Tim's team's efforts since the Movember Golf Day started.

We have been supporting Childhood Cancer Association for seven years and have funded a variety of initiatives as well as contributing to the provision of their ongoing services. Part of these services is accommodation for families of children who travel to Adelaide from regional SA for cancer treatment. The move to Adelaide is usually urgent and immediate for treatment to start as soon as possible. Their accommodation is in family units close to the Women’s and Children’s Hospital.

Victor Harbor depot, led by Michael James, stepped up (or pushed up) as part of the Push Up Challenge in 2022 to raise funds for mental health in their local community. They raised funds for Lifeline and Headspace Victor Harbor with donations to both charities resulting from their efforts.

Backpacks 4 SA Kids, who are a major partner, supply backpacks and anchor packs to providers of children’s and youth services (mainly the Department of Child Protection) across South Australia. While the plight of displaced children and young people is not always visible, it is sadly widespread. Backpacks are delivered to service providers in every part of South Australia ready to go to kids in need.

Other charity partners that support regional South Australians include Can:Do 4Kids, MND South Australia, Women’s and Children’s Hospital Foundation, See Differently, Australian Lions Hearing Dogs and Novita.

Crisis Support

At the start of 2022 we were faced with unprecedented floods in New South Wales and Queensland, where an entire year's worth of rain fell in just a few days. While the Employee Foundation has a mission to support the South Australian community, at the time we felt the need was so great, we should lead a flood appeal. We kicked off our appeal in early 2022 and, with the help of SA Power Networks, donated \$25,000 to the Red Cross Flood Appeal.

In the midst of a bleak and wet winter in Adelaide and with a rental housing crisis, the Adelaide Day Centre for Homeless Persons had an unexpected spike in demand for sleeping bags and blankets for people who were sleeping rough for the first time. Kylie Kerrigan saw this in the media and drove an Employee Fundraiser to collect supplies as well as raise funds for them. A car full of blankets and sleeping bags were delivered to Adelaide Day Centre plus a donation of \$2,100 which blew them away. At the end of 2022 an additional \$5,000 was donated to this grass roots organisation to keep people safe, warm and fed over the Christmas season.



During this same winter, and also due mainly to the rental housing crisis, the RSPCA had an influx of pets whose owners were no longer able to keep them. The RSPCA put out a call for supplies and once again our people stepped up with towels, blankets, toys and food for the animals in their care. A group of staff delivered the supplies to the Lonsdale shelter with a donation of \$500. The group got to meet the cats in care and chat to staff and volunteers at the shelter who were very grateful for our unexpected generosity.

In the lead up to Christmas we responded to the call for food supplies for the residents of the Murray River region who were being displaced by floods. We collected non-perishable food and raised funds for Foodbank to then assist those affected by the floods. In 2022, a total of \$18,100 was donated to Foodbank to help with hunger relief.



In 2022 we also provided support to Ukrainian refugees through the donation of laptops to the Ukrainian Association in Adelaide and also raised funds for Human Appeal International for relief for Pakistan Floods.

Employee Fundraisers



Our Employee Fundraisers (previously called Workplace Initiatives) resulted in donations of over \$200,000 spread across 33 different charities supporting the South Australian community in 2022. Every one of these took employee commitment, time and energy and drew on the support of the community as well as family and friends of our people.


Melissa Rasche from Angle Park is a champion, not only of fund raising for animal rescue and care but also for the cause and the promotion of rescue and animal adoption. In 2022 Mel's efforts resulted in donations to eight different rescue charities across metropolitan and regional South Australia and across a broad range of animals, starting with cats and kittens but reaching to chickens, goats, dogs, cows, lambs and even horses.

We have participated in the Walk to D-Feet MND since 2016 resulting in a total of \$93,000 donated to help support MND sufferers and their carers. Belinda Bryan and Leanne Craig, as well as their families, have been champions of the event for a number of years, with other employees joining at different times.



Our people have had a team in the Hutt St Centre's Walk a Mile in My Boots fundraiser since its inception. Due to COVID restrictions, the traditional event could not be held, so we instead gathered our team at our Keswick office and walked a mile from our headquarters over to the South Park Lands and back. Our Executive General Manager Customer and Community, Jessica Vonthethoff led our team in fundraising and on our walk. It was a wet and miserable morning which was a perfect backdrop to us raising funds for those sleeping rough in winter.

Brian Docking (Doc) from Pole Construction is well known as an essential part of our Relay For Life event but in recent years has also been participating in the Apex Outback Postie Ride. The ride raises money to support accommodation for regional cancer patients travelling to Adelaide for treatment and respite holidays for families going through the cancer journey. Doc's crazy efforts in 2022 resulted in an amazing \$12,800 donation.

As well as being a project partner, The Mary Potter Foundation has been the recipient of funds from employee fundraising through their annual Walk for Love. Our CEO Rob Stobbe has led our Walk for Love team for many years, with a lot of our staff having a close personal connection to the Mary Potter Hospice.

Cameron Hillam and his team from Enerven at Ferrymen Park ran Mullets for Mental Health to raise funds for Black Dog Institute in recognition of the significant increase in mental health issues over the last few years. The team's shaving efforts resulted in \$4,800 being donated to Black Dog Institute.



Our Variety Bash team went above and beyond, both in their fundraising and Scooby Doo vehicle, with a total of \$18,300 being donated to Variety SA in 2022 as a result of their amazing efforts.

For the second year we participated in the Operation Flinders Foundation's City to Summit challenge with the IT department leading the way. The team's phenomenal effort resulted in \$13,300 being donated to Operation Flinders Foundation to support young people from challenging backgrounds.

The Leukaemia Foundation's World's Greatest Shave event has been on our calendar for eight years now. In 2022 we had Max Altschwager and Hughie Tucker step up and shave for the cause and raise an amazing \$13,400 for leukaemia research and support.

In October 2022, Leigh Cardinal led the charge of frocking up every day to raise funds for ovarian cancer. Executive General Manager Network, Doug Schmidt (with significant help from Brooke Altman), hosted our Frocktober morning tea. We had loads of fun and donated a whopping \$9,600 to the Ovarian Cancer Research Foundation.

There were many more Employee Initiatives during 2022, with a huge congratulations and thanks to all the employees who hosted or supported these amazing efforts.
